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Courageously Hopeful

'DO NOT BE AFRAID... KEEP UP YOUR Courage...'

ACTS 27:24-25

I recently had the privilege of preaching at a CPAS patronage church on Paul's shipwreck in Acts 27. I was struck that, despite his companions veering between foolhardy confidence and catastrophizing, Paul brought a message of qualified reassurance: the ship would be lost, but their lives would be saved.

At CPAS, one of our emerging values is being 'courageously hopeful.' We aim to be a non-anxious presence amid stormy seas, enabling Christian leaders to face their pressures with renewed hope and courage.

Paul was able to host a non-anxious space, founded not in his own self-confidence but in the only truly non-anxious presence, God himself. As the angel of God said, 'Do not be afraid... keep up your courage...' Drawing on God's faithfulness, Paul prayed and broke bread with the sailors, soldiers, and prisoners. In trying circumstances, there was space for grace. Much was lost but their lives were saved, and God's eternal purposes were not thwarted.

As we contemplate the stormy seas of the church today, many of us face losing some things we hold dear. It's easy to fall into foolhardy confidence or catastrophizing thinking, but if our confidence rests on God's unchanging faithfulness rather than the structures of ministry we have known, then we too can find Paul's courage to continue to create a space for grace in our local communities, that people may continue to find Jesus in their midst.

May we all hear again the angel's message: 'Do not be afraid... keep up your courage.'

Investing in Younger Leaders

Listening to the people we seek to serve is essential. Matt Hogg, one of our Leadership Enablers, shared how the Leadership Development team prioritises time to connecting with younger leaders. For 25 years now they have done so through the Arrow Leadership programme which is aimed at leaders between 25 and 40 years old. Here Matt shares some of the other ways CPAS has recently connected with younger leaders.

Ver the last two years we have committed even more time to connecting with younger leaders. Not only does this help us keep up to date with the opportunities and challenges leaders face, but it also enables us to produce timely and impactful resources that better equip churches for mission.

Matt Hogg said: 'We've hosted online focus groups, gatherings, and webinars, wrestling with subjects like





Leadership and Church Planting, Culture Change and Leadership and more. Peer-to-peer learning events have also enabled younger leaders to engage with senior leaders and learn from their experience.'

Matt continued: 'These times have been so powerful for participants but also for us as Leadership Enablers because we see the passion, the energy, the commitment, but also the desire to make a difference for Jesus in the local context. It has given us lots to reflect on and it has helped to guide our own resource development process.'

Ventures and Falcons Behind the Scenes

There is nothing quite like a CPAS holiday. Every year, thousands of children and young people gather across the country for a week of fun, faith and friendship.

We consistently sing the praises of the incredible volunteers who make these holidays happen. However, hidden away at Sovereign Court in Coventry, there is also a team of coordinators working behind the scenes without whom this ministry would not happen.

Beth Mawdesley was a volunteer Venture leader at the holiday Quantock before she joined CPAS as Ventures and Falcons Coordinator in March 2024. When asked what surprised her about the role, she said: 'just how much work goes on behind the scenes to ensure we run safe holidays that enable young people to have loads

'So many things happen simultaneously,' said Beth. 'We agree the budget with the Overall Leaders of each holiday and pencil in site locations, going through the lengthy booking processes to secure them.

'Between this and bookings opening, the team are planning the overall leader's conference,' continued Brooke. 'This is a gathering of 80+ leaders from across the country who are trained and equipped for the upcoming season. We're both really excited for our first conference.'

We asked what tasks need to be completed after bookings open in January.

'Again, so many things happen all at once,' explained Beth. 'While the fantastic Overall Leaders complete the safer recruitment of thousands of volunteers, we support them by obtaining DBS checks, ensuring references are returned and safeguarding training is completed. We're paying final invoices, as well as liaising with sites and Overall Leaders to make things work for both parties. It's a mammoth task and each coordinator has up to 20 holidays they do this for.'

'What makes it possible and enjoyable is that we have a great team at CPAS,' shared Brooke. 'There is a really collaborative and supportive environment which we are so grateful for.'

When we asked what the highlight of their roles was, they were both quick to say: 'We can't wait to hear all the stories about what has happened on the holidays and what God has done!'

As Jo concluded: 'There is a real buzz within the team as we count down to January. We are excited to see what God is going to do, but we're also keen to listen and learn how we sustain and grow this ministry to benefit the next generation of leaders.'

Celebrating 100 Years of CPAS Holidays

The Beginning

n 1924, in the fields of Coldharbour, Surrey, 24 children aged between twelve and fifteen years old huddled around a crackling campfire. Away from their harsh lives as factory workers, they sang, shared stories and heard good news that has changed lives for two millennia.

The first CPAS holiday was an exciting, bold new direction of ministry. Looking back, the camp leader wrote: 'How we sang! At first we shouted! But as the days went on, one knew that the girls were realising the truth of what they were singing... we had the joy of knowing that girl after girl sought and found the saviour.'

One of the first attendees wrote back about the impact it had on her: 'I am having some children... I am going to learn them some of the choruses and tell them about the Lord Jesus who is my Shepard, and that is all I want. My little brother and I has gave our whole selves to Jesus.'





Stories Through the Decades

The lives of children throughout the decades continued to be transformed as they encountered the love of Christ on these holidays.

Philip Bounds shared this story: 'I have memories of singing round campfires at night, having a quiet time each morning, and dorm (a large tent) prayers each night. We peeled

oday, 100 years since that first holiday, young people across the UK are still gathering around campfires, singing songs and sharing faith in life-changing moments on Venture and Falcon holidays.

Eden has attended Venture holidays for the last four years. Reflecting on her story, she said: 'I've always gone to church since I was a baby and I've known Jesus. But there was a time at the Venture holiday last year where we were sat around the campfire, and we were all just singing songs of worship. Seeing how much God meant to people made me realise how much he meant to me. It sealed my certainty of my faith in Christ and led to me getting baptised.'

We give thanks to God for every campfire story like this and can't wait to see what the next century brings.

potatoes for what seemed like an army, but would then go on super walks and trips; climbing Helvellyn was the best, even though the clouds descended. Bible teaching, quizzes, hearty singing and testimonies were all part of an experience that had a massive influence on my life... Sixty-two years have passed since that first holiday, and I can honestly say that experience changed my life.'



Oversight Ministry



Earlier this year, David, Head of Communications at CPAS, caught up with Sarah Pix, one of our Leadership Enablers, to learn more about CPAS' role in helping leaders in oversight roles.

So, Sarah, what is Oversight Ministry?

Sarah: Oversight Ministry is a change from the traditional way of leading church. With fewer clergy available, we've seen an increase in Multi-Parish Benefices (MPBs) where one incumbent has oversight over several churches. The largest we've come across is one incumbent with oversight of 27 parishes. Further pressure has led to even larger mission areas encompassing several MPBs, fresh expressions and new worshipping communities, where multiple local leaders are overseen by a minister with oversight responsibility. Why is it so important that CPAS trains incumbents in Oversight Ministry?

Sarah: We are helping church leaders transition into a whole new working paradigm. Clergy that try to keep working in the traditional model are burning out because you cannot be in five places at once.

We're encouraging church leaders to see themselves as a leader of leaders; where before they did much of the ministry themselves, now it's about raising up those around them, nurturing effective teams who then serve in various areas of ministry. I can hear your passion and enthusiasm. What is it about this work that inspires you?

Sarah: While these changes are necessary due to declining church attendance, I think we can see God at work here. Perhaps we are returning to a New Testament model of church leadership. The apostle Paul was a classic oversight minister: travelling around, sending letters of encouragement and building up local church leaders.

When Oversight Ministry is done well it can be empowering, releasing people to step into positions of service and leadership.

That sounds really good. Can you share what the Oversight Ministry Course is?

Sarah: Over a year, we work with clergy in oversight roles in small groups. During this time, we provide six 'colleges' covering a range of topics, from practical leadership to resilience and self-care. There is plenty of opportunity to root the learning into each person's context and reflect on the challenges, opportunities and losses which come with this change in working practice.

School Ventures: The Next Chapter

t's a sunny May Saturday afternoon at an activity centre in Lancashire. Sixty children, accompanied by teachers from three local primary schools, are being led through an interactive programme on the Easter story by volunteers from churches in Blackburn Diocese. The mood is light, smiles are everywhere and the gospel is being shared.

Months of planning has culminated in something special. This is School Ventures in action.

Overall Leader, Mike Barton said: 'School Ventures provides a brilliant way for church volunteers to invest in their local school. Strong and healthy relationships are built with the children and the teachers, while investing in the children's faith in Jesus in wonderful, fun, and potentially life transforming ways.'

According to a study by Youthscape, 68% of UK churches have less than five children. While statistics make it all too easy to despair, thankfully with God, 'all things are possible for one who believes'.

At CPAS, we are full of faith and expectation for the next generation's future. With 4,632 Church of England schools in England,



imagine the possibilities for collaboration between local churches and schools to reach young people with the gospel.

In School Ventures, we're applying a century's worth of knowledge and experience gained through our Venture and Falcon holidays to help churches engage with their local schools more effectively across the country.

The School Venture programme has started something, and we are excited to grow this ministry so that every child in the UK has the opportunity to explore faith in Jesus.

Safer Spaces



Since appointing Elspeth Young, our Safeguarding Manager, here are some of the ways CPAS has been working to ensure children and young people on CPAS holidays can access and enjoy the safest of spaces.

We trained 100 Safeguarding Officers and Deputy Safeguarding Officers across all holidays. We delivered this scenariobased webinar with our Safeguarding Consultants, Thirtyone:eight, giving leaders insight into real-life scenarios and updating them on the changes to safeguarding practice we have made. These include the launch of our Child Protection Online Management System for faster and more efficient safeguarding incident reporting, safer data storage and live support for managing concerns. 'Safeguarding requires constant learning, adapting and changing to the needs of the times. What we have done these past six months is embed safeguarding at the heart of what we do. My thanks goes to everyone, at every level, for their desire and determination to make this happen. A special thanks goes to our volunteers, who have provided excellent support for all the young people on our holidays and have embraced the changes made with fervour.'

2 We enhanced our safer recruitment practices for all volunteers, which now includes the mandatory completion of a basic training module created by CPAS to be context specific to our holidays.

3 We continued strengthening the rapport with our holidays by providing personalised support and guidance on a case-by-case basis.

Advert to Appointment

The Licensing Service is the moment where months, sometimes years, of planning come to a wonderful conclusion. The new incumbent and any family are welcomed by their new community as the leader of the church and parish. Pictured is the recently appointed the Rev Tim May at his joyful Licensing service at St James Hemingford Grey.

But what needs to happen to get to this point? How is a new vicar appointed?

The Appointment Process

In our capacity as patron, CPAS works with Bishops, Archdeacons and parishes to appoint missionminded clergy into leadership positions. We sat down with Dagmer Dias, Executive Assistant to the Patronage Team, to walk us through the process: 'Our team begins by attending a prevacancy meeting at the church with the Diocese and patrons to explain the recruitment process. Afterwards, a Section 11 meeting is called and the Parish Representatives, all volunteers, are appointed.' In the past year, the CPAS Patronage Team has helped fill over 60 vacancies across the country, including the Reverend Tim May. When asked about CPAS' role in supporting the appointment process, Archdeacon Richard Harlow said:

'CPAS Patronage helped us make a brilliant appointment in a complex situation. Knowing that someone, with the depth of experience that CPAS' Mike Duff brings to this role, was supporting the parish, helped us bring out strengths and challenges so that we were able to discern well whom God was calling to lead these two parishes on the next stage of their life together.'

At the time of writing, 152 vacancies are still open.

'We work with the PCC and Parish Reps to create a Parish Profile and agree application dates. The advert then goes live.' Assuming we have had a good uptake in applications, we begin the shortlisting process which leads to a panel meeting. Finally, the big day arrives when all candidates are given a parish tour and a formal interview.'

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'To appoint, there must be a consensus between patron, Diocese and parish, after which work begins for the licensing service.'
